### **Structured Academic Conversation Notes**

*Instructions:* After listening to Tobias Smith's lecture and answering the focus questions on his talk, you and your partner will need to decide the answers to the following central questions:

- Are rights culturally universal or culturally relative?
- What is a constitution?

### 4. Summative Assessment (for homework).

Choose one of the following prompts to answer in an essay format using the information from Tobias Smith's lecture, the class discussion, and the other sources.

- How is the United States and the Chinese Constitutions similar and/or different?
- Are legal rights culturally universal or does culture affect people's fundamental legal rights?
- Is dissent ever justified? Under what circumstances?
